Calm and Clamor: Exhibit Opening

STATESBORO, Ga., [June 22, 2011] – The Averitt Center for the Arts' "Calm and Clamor" exhibit will open in the main gallery on July 1. The exhibit will feature the paintings of Christopher Paul and the sculptures of Duke Oursler. Both artists address similar concepts but in very different media.

Paul seeks to capture dynamic moments in his paintings by layering puddles of water born color, coffee, and other mixed media. Paul's work is deliberate yet unconscious, a poetic gesture of natural forces.

Oursler, a graduate of Georgia Southern, forges metal, hews stone and carves wood. He combines the elements into abstract expressions of time and the physics of space. His work is industrial and raw, yet refined. Oursler's work is in stark contrast to the richly colored paintings of Paul.

Both artists rely on surface treatment, color, and the simplicity of their materials to capture the tangible essence of time and to express the collision of man mad with nature—one through painting, the other through objects.

The Opening Reception will be on July 1 at 7:00 p.m. Those who attend will be entered in a raffle for tickets for the Broadway hit *Hairspray*, a young Averitt STARS summer musical production.

STATESBORO, Ga., [June 22, 2011] – The Broadway hit *Hairspray* will be performed in the Emma Kelly Theater by the Averitt STARS for your enjoyment on July 22 and 23, 2011 at 7:30 p.m. and July 24, 2011 at 2 p.m.

Hairspray is a fun, musical social commentary on the American 60's. Tracy Turnblad, a plump teenager, dreams of dancing on *The Corny Collins Show*. She is discouraged from auditioning because of her size, although she is a better dancer than most of the kids on the show. Once Tracy musters the courage to audition, she is thrilled to be chosen to appear. She then becomes an overnight celebrity. After her success, Tracy launches a campaign to breakdown other social stereotypes on the show and in her hometown.

"I have always wanted to play Tracy," said Monica Mead, the Waynesboro, GA native who portrays the spunky lead character in the Averitt Junior STARS production. "She inspires me because she doesn't let the fact that she's different stop her from following her dreams and making a difference in her world."

"I love the fact that Tracy sees more to people than just what they look like on the outside," Mead continued. "She doesn't see fat or thin, black or white, she sees people as equals and friends."

This full length version of *Hairspray* is directed by Angie Hamilton and musical director Janice Smith. The choreography is by Lindsey Durden. The show is presented by Averitt Junior STARS.

Following an early *Hairspray* tradition, Tracy's mother, Edna, will be played by Scott Marchbanks. Penny, Tracy's perky best friend, will be played by Sydney Davis. Brooks Adams is the Corny Collins Show host. This comical musical features the singing and dancing talents of over 55 local actors.

STATESBORO, **Ga.** – Contestants crawled in mud during the adventure race last Friday at Southern Adventure's 7th Annual Iron Eagle Challenge hosted on Georgia Southern's campus.

The race featured running, biking, and paddling challenges along with several mystery challenges.

"The mystery challenges were all random, but were challenging and fun," said Candace Cleverly, a GSU student.

Some of these mystery challenges included a slip-n-slide, astronomy, water balloon tossing, and a mud crawl.

The divisions of the race were split up into three categories Men's, Women's, and Co-ed with a total of 36 teams participating in the race.
